This guide breaks down the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) proficiency levels, showing you what your learner "can do" at each stage of their language development. These levels describe real-world communication abilities, helping you see their tangible growth.

## What Your Child Can Do at Each Level: The "Can-Do" Statements

The ACTFL framework outlines a continuous path of language development, from a beginner explorer to an expert communicator. Below, you'll find what your learner can typically understand, say, and share in Korean at each specific level, along with an estimated time it might take to reach that stage.

\*Note on Estimated Time to Reach: Korean is classified as a Group 4 language. This classification indicates that it is among the languages that typically require more study time for English speakers to reach proficiency compared to other language groups. The hours provided are general estimates for an average learner of Korean. This can vary significantly based on individual aptitude, consistency of study, and immersion opportunities. These figures represent cumulative study hours.
